

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A preliminary phase of the research on indigenous peoples living in the Global 200 ecoregions, carried out via cross-institutional collaboration by Global 200 scientists, was developed for WWF International in 1998 by the Centre for People Education and Promotion (CEPP) and Paola Silva. With contributions from Swati Needy and Belinda Bush. Revision of the previous tabulated list of indigenous peoples by ecoregion was taken up in 1998-99 by Arithra Follen-Bailey.

Regional-scale mappings of ethnolinguistic groups were carried out for North America north of Mexico, Victor M. Toledo (National Autonomous University of Mexico) and P. Araceli Chávez, A. Rodríguez Alba, and M.J. Orozco; and Dr Manuel Lizarazo (Connecticut College) for South America. Dr Lizarazo oversaw the initial mapping of the data on coverage of traditional lands and territories. The data were then mapped onto the Global 200 ecoregions. The revised list of indigenous peoples by ecoregion was developed by Michael K. H. Loh (WWF International).

Regional-scale mappings of ethnolinguistic groups onto ecoregions were carried out for Mexico (in collaboration with P. Araceli Chávez, A. Rodríguez Alba, and M.J. Orozco); and Dr Manuel Lizarazo (Connecticut College) for South America. Dr Lizarazo oversaw the initial mapping of the data on coverage of traditional lands and territories.
